

Fifteen managers of academic research libraries have been appointed UCLA Senior Fellows for 1999. The managers will attend a three-week program conducted at UCLA August 8–27, 1999. The program was established in 1982 with the support of the Council on Library Resources, UCLA, and the institutions represented by the participating fellows. **Pamela Arceneaux**, 17-year veteran and collection specialist at the Williams Research Center at the Historic New Orleans Collection, was awarded the Lucy B. Foote Award. The award is given annually in memory of Foote, a native of St. Mary Parish who made contributions to state libraries with her career interests in Louisiana state documents and special collections.

Three members of ACRL's Education and Behavior Sciences Section—**Jo Ann Carr**, director of the Center for Instructional Materials and Computing at the University of Wisconsin, Madison; **John Collins III**, librarian in the Gutman Library at Harvard; and **Nancy P. Network (NEN). NEN is a congressionally mandated outreach effort by the National Library of Education. O'Brien is chairing the committee.

**Les Pourciau**, a 1975 graduate of the School of Library and Information Science (SLIS) at Indiana University, has been selected to receive the SLIS 1999 Distinguished Alumni Award. Pourciau received numerous nominations from around the world for his global influence in the field of library technology. The award will be officially presented in the fall in Bloomington, Indiana.

**Maureen Sullivan**, ACRL President and organizational development consultant, is the recipient of ALA's 1999 Elizabeth Futas Catalyst for Change Award.

The award recognizes and honors a librarian who invests time and talent to make positive changes in the profession of librarianship. Sarah Pritchard, jury chair, said, Sullivan "has been a leader and an activist in mentoring librarians, in encouraging change and development through participating in ALA, and inspiring librarians across all types of libraries to envision a different professional future and to excel in their work." The \$1,000 award and citation will be presented at the ALA Annual Conference in New Orleans on June 29.

Henderson has chaired the Federal Networking Council Advisory Committee, which was charged with providing technical and strategic advice for the development of the advanced networking for research and education. **Philip Tompkins** will retire as university librarian and executive director of libraries at

Indiana University/Purdue University Indianapolis (IUPUI) on August 1, 1999. He has worked at libraries at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, CUNY's Brooklyn College, Mesa and Estrella Mountain Community Colleges, and the University of Southern California

where he was coordinator of planning for the new teaching library (Leavey) from 1985-90. For the last 15 years Tompkins has specialized in planning, designing, and operating integrated library/high technology centers, developing team-based library organizations, and instructional team initiatives. The most recent library building he developed was IUPUI's Payton Philanthropic Studies Library, dedicated April 28, 1999.

**Wojciech Zalewski** has retired as Stanford's curator for Slavic and East European Collections. Curator since 1972, Zalewski was a successful multilingual diplomat and negotiator in command economy booktrades that resisted rationalization during the Bloc days. Zalewski began his career with Stanford Libraries as a library specialist and later became the acting curator. He has also been a lecturer in Stanford's Department of Slavic Languages and Literatures since 1975. Zalewski has published or edited a dozen books in his curatorial field, bibliography, and librarianship. He will continue working at Stanford as the bibliographer for religious studies.

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## Deaths

**Arthur T. Hamlin**, 85, retired director of libraries at Temple University in Philadelphia (1968-79), died on January 20. Prior to this position, he was director of libraries at the University of Cincinnati for 12 years. Hamlin

held two senior Fulbright Program grants—one as a lecturer at the University of Pavia in Italy in 1961 and another at the University of Birmingham, England. In 1966 the ALA sent him to Florence to investigate flood damage to libraries. He was a life member of the ALA and ACRL (executive director from 1949-56), a member of the Bibliographical Society of America and several state library associations. Hamlin is the author of centennial histories of Harvard's first alumni club and the Cincinnati club. He had his history of university libraries published in 1981.

**Elaine Kirkpatrick Rast** died in February in Chicago. In the 1960s she participated in OCLC (Online Computer Library Center at Ohio State University). Later she was adjunct professor at Dominican University in River Forest, Illinois, and full professor at Founders Library at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb. She was an active member of the ALA and a member of the National Association of Serials Internet Group from its inception, where she served as a member of the Executive Board from 1988-93. Rast was Illinois Academic Librarian of the Year in 1993. She most recently served as archivist for Rainbow PUSH Coalition and rare books cataloger at the Adler Planetarium.

**Rochelle Sager**, library director at Molloy College Library in Rockville, New York, has died. She also served as library director of the Fashion Institute of Technology in Manhattan. Sager was an active member of ACRL/NY and of ACRL, serving on the Board of Directors as director-at-large (1985-89) and as ACRL's councillor (1990-94). Contributions can be made in
